



Dear members

Despite threatening clouds there were good attendances at both the Kyneton and Trentham Remembrance Day services conducted by the Kyneton RSL this year. About 150 people gathered in Kyneton to remember the fallen with about 50 attending the ceremony in Trentham. Again, students from schools in Kyneton and the district played a prominent role in the ceremonies doing readings, prayers and poems. The RSL feels it is important for the younger generation to be involved in these services of remembrance so that the sacrifices of their forebears are not

We feel it also important that the older generation, many of whom are unable to attend ceremonies, are not forgotten and members of the Kyneton RSL conducted Remembrance Day ceremonies at Ray M Begg Kyneton Aged Care, BUPA and Trentham Aged Care. These services are always much appreciated by the residents.

The annual Poppy Appeal was conducted in the lead up to Remembrance Day and residents of Kyneton and the surrounding district again displayed their generosity by donating a total of \$8600 to the Appeal. All of the money donated will go towards veterans' welfare. On behalf of all our veterans I would like to thank all those who donated to the Appeal.

Since our last Newsletter, services commemorating VP Day, Vietnam Veterans' Day and Beersheba Day have also been conducted by the Sub-Branch. Beersheba Day, in particular, was highlighted by the presence of the 4th/8th Light Horse Troop mounted on horses and dressed in the original uniforms of Australian Light Horsemen.

Following the sudden passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in September, the Sub-Branch conducted a memorial service in her honour. The Queen had been the patron of the RSL for all of her 70 years reign.

A reminder that memberships are now due for renewal and letters have been sent to all those Service and Affiliate members who are in renewal status. Please remember that if you do not renew before 31 January 2023, your membership will lapse and all privileges will cease until the membership is renewed. The Committee has also agreed to waive the membership fees for all our Service members over the age of 80.

We have been able to fund services such as gutter cleaning, window cleaning, general maintenance including grass mowing and other services around the home. We are particularly conscious of rising utility prices. If you are a veteran and in need of assistance please do not hesitate to contact us.

A further note on veterans. For the past few months we have been conducting a Veterans Catch Up on the last Sunday of the month for veterans to get together and swap some yarns over a cuppa or glass. Please feel free to come along and enjoy the company of some of your fellow veterans. The November Catch Up will be on 27 November whilst the December one will be on 18 December.

The Courtesy Bus has proven to be a huge success enabling members to enjoy a visit to the RSL and not have to worry about driving.

Our annual combined Veterans/Legacy Christmas lunch will be held on 6 December. If you would like to attend please get in early as seating is limited. RSVP is 30 November.

Kyneton RSL Commemorates Beersheba Day

On 31 October, members of the Kyneton RSL commemorated the Battle of Beersheba with a short service and wreath-laying ceremony at the Light Horse Monument in Jennings Street. The ceremony was supported by members of the 4th/8th Light Horse Troop mounted on their horses and dressed in the original uniforms of the Australian Light Horsemen.

Victory at Beersheba fell to one of the last great charges of mounted troops in history. As Australian Light Horse Divisions captured the town and secured crucial water wells, their success also marked the beginning of the end of the war in the Middle East which came to an end exactly a year to the day after success at Beersheba.

Kyneton has had a long history of military involvement. As early as 1859 there was enthusiastic support for the formation of a Mounted Rifles troop. At about this time other country towns in the near vicinity formed their own troops and all eventually trained together. It was inevitable for the economy of scale that these would all join together, and thus the detachments of Kyneton Light Horse and Kyneton Infantry Rifles came into being. These became part of the amalgamated Victorian Volunteer Light Horse and Victorian Volunteer Rifle Corps and following the approval of the Prince of Wales the newly created units came under the umbrella of the Prince of Wales Light Horse, a regiment (the 4th/19th) that still exists and has regularly participated in ANZAC Day ceremonies in Kyneton.

430 SQN Cadets Form the Flag Party

A small but appreciative crowd gathered at the Cenotaph in Kyneton on Thursday, 22 September to pay their respects to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II following her passing on 9 September. The solemn ceremony was organised jointly by the Kyneton and Woodend RSL Sub-Branches. Cadets from the Braemar College Cadet Unit

formed the Catafalque Party and cadets from 430 Squadron AAFC formed the flag party. In his address, the President of the Kyneton RSL spoke of the tremendous changes that had occurred through the Queen's 70-year reign and how she had adapted to those changes. John McAusland, President of the Woodend RSL, recited a poem by British Poet Laureate,

Simon Armitage, which he penned following the death of the Queen. Wreaths were laid by the two RSLs as well as other community organisations and members of the public against the background of Amazing Grace played by highland piper, Ross Redwin. It was a fitting tribute to a much-loved monarch.



Kyneton RSL Commemorates VP Day

August 15th is commemorated each year as Victory in the Pacific Day (VP Day). It is the day in 1945 when the Japanese surrendered unconditionally to the allied nations with the ceasefire agreement being signed aboard the USS Missouri. This agreement finally brought to end all hostilities in World War II. To commemorate the 77th anniversary of the end of the war in the Pacific, the Kyneton RSL held a ceremony at the RSL to remember all those who paid the supreme sacrifice during World War II. A few of the remaining World War II veterans were in attendance at the ceremony. These were Joyce Daymon who served with the Australian Air Force, Jim Foreman and Tim Collins who were both WWII navy veterans and John Wyke, who served in the RAF as a Lancaster tail gunner with 626

Also at the ceremony was Sir Phillip Bennett AC KBE DSO, now a resident at RM Begg Kyneton Aged Care. Sir Phillip was Chief of the Defence Force from 1984 to 1987 and later the Governor of Tasmania from 1987 to 1995. He served with the British Commonwealth Occupation Forces in Japan just after World War II and was also a Korean and Vietnam veteran. Following the ceremony the guests were entertained to lunch hosted by the President of the Kyneton RSL, John Taubman.

Kyneton RSL Commemorates Vietnam Veterans Day

Vietnam Veterans Day is commemorated on 18th August every year. The day was originally known as Long Tan Day. On that day, 108 Australian and New Zealand soldiers fought a pitched battle against over 2000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops in a rubber plantation not far from the small village of Long Tan in Phuoc Tuy province of the then Republic of South Vietnam. Eighteen Australians lost their lives and 24 were wounded, the largest number of casualties in one operation since the Australian task force had arrived a few months earlier. In what was at the time Australia's longest war, some 60,000 Australian troops served in Vietnam with 521 killed and some 3000 wounded, many of whom still bear physical and psychological scars of their time in Vietnam.

To honour those who died during the battle of Long Tan and throughout the whole Vietnam War, the Kyneton RSL held a small ceremony at the RSL attended by a number of Vietnam veterans and their partners.

A chance photograph, shown here, taken at the Kyneton ANZAC Day ceremony earlier this year sparked interest in who the recipient of both the Victoria Cross and Distinguished Conduct Medal might be. Linda Bennett, a resident of Malmsbury, was photographed wearing a ribbon bar with both of these medals as well as medals from both World Wars and the King George VI Coronation Medal at the far right. It was quite an unusual combination of medals. It transpires that the medals belonged to Walter Ernest Brown who was born in New Norfolk, Tasmania on 3 July 1885 to Sidney Francis Brown and Agnes Mary Brown (nee Carney).

Walter enlisted in the 1st AIF in July 1915 and was initially assigned to the 1st Australian Light Horse Regiment before being transferred to the Imperial Camel Corps in Egypt. After being transferred to France he was assigned to the 55th Battalion, Australian Infantry, 1st and 2nd Field Butcheries, Australian Service Corps; and then, finally, the 20th Battalion, 5th Brigade, 2nd Division. He managed to secure his transfer to the infantry by claiming that he had lost his false teeth, which meant that he had to be removed from the theatre and returned to Egypt, where he was able to attach himself to the infantry reinforcements that were being concentrated there prior to being sent to France to join the 20th Battalion.

His transfer to the 20th Battalion took place in July 1917 and he joined them while they were stationed in the line around St Omer. During September and October 1917, Brown took part in the fighting around Passchendaele and it was for his actions during this time that he was later awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

On 6 July 1918 at Villers-Bretonneux, France he performed the deed for which he was awarded the Victoria Cross: Brown had rushed a machine-gun post armed with a hand grenade, taking one officer and 11 men prisoner under heavy machine-gun fire. After this incident Brown remained at the front until the end of the war.

Following the outbreak of World War II, Brown enlisted as a gunner under his real name in the 2/15th Field Regiment, Royal Australian Artillery in June 1940. Hoping to avoid attention and wanting to secure a posting to the front lines, he declared that he had "no previous military experience" and also claimed he had been born in 1900 in order to meet the age requirements for front line service. Although his identity became public knowledge, the military authorities allowed him to continue serving


In 1942 his unit was sent to Singapore following the Japanese attack on Malaya. On 15 February 1942, Brown's regiment moved up to the front line to make a final stand. Sources disagree as to what happened to Brown after this. When the order to surrender came, some witnesses alleged him to have calmly picked up some grenades and said: "No surrender for me", before walking towards the

enemy lines, never to be seen again. Author John Moremon, however, believes that Brown sought to escape and after gaining permission from his commanding officer, led a group of 2/15th men to Rengat, in Sumatra, in a rowing boat. From there it is believed that Brown and the others attempted to link up with other troops that were being evacuated via bus, but they became separated and although some managed to get away to Padang, Brown is believed to have been killed while waiting for transport.

Although his date of death is uncertain, it has been presumed that Brown was killed some time after he went missing, and the Commonwealth War Graves Commission officially records his date of death as 28 February 1942. As his body was never found, Brown has no known grave, although he is commemorated at the Singapore Memorial at Kranji War Cemetery in Singapore.

For his bravery and service during two World Wars, he was awarded the Victoria Cross, the Distinguished Conduct Medal, the 1914-15 Star, the British War Medal 1914-20, the Victory Medal, the 1939-45 Star, the Pacific Star, the Defence Medal, the War Medal 1939-45, the Australian Service Medal 1939-45 and the King George VI Coronation Medal.
